

## CONFERENCE GOALS

## Lessons Learned and Moving Forward

### Update on Michigan Healthcare Preparedness Program

*Linda Scott, BSN, MA*

This session will identify current Michigan Office of Public Health Preparedness (OPHP) Hospital Preparedness initiatives.

### Accomplishing Joint Commission Standards through Participation in the Hospital Preparedness Program

*Don Edwards, DO, FACEP, FACOEP*

This session will demonstrate how Emergency Management Standards covered during a Joint Commission survey can be satisfied through participation in the Michigan Hospital Preparedness Program.

### Allocation of Scarce Medical Resources During Hurricane Katrina

*Ben deBoisblanc, MD, FACP, FCCP, FCCM*

During Hurricane Katrina, Dr. deBoisblanc treated patients with limited resources keeping 11 critically ill patients alive. Lessons learned and ethical implications of treating patients with scarce medical resources will be shared during this session.

### History of Hospital and Health Care Facility Evacuations: Lessons Learned

This session will review the history of selected prominent hospital and healthcare facility evacuations and help identify lessons learned from these events.

### Hospital Security - Improving Healthcare System Emergency Preparedness in the Nation's Capitol

The District of Columbia Emergency Healthcare Coalition conducted hospital security risk assessments which lead to strategic hospital plans, exercises and trainings for law enforcement and healthcare workers to improve overall emergency preparedness. Techniques and lessons learned will provide attendees with strategies to implement security measures within their own healthcare systems.

### The Use of Crisis Standards of Care at the Hospital Level: From the Institute of Medicine Report to H1N1 and Haiti

This presentation will review the background and need for a crisis standard of care from the hospital to local and statewide levels. The development and role of hospital and regional triggers, along with bedside care plans will be discussed as well as the outline for a hospital based plan.

### Thinking Spatially About Healthcare Preparedness

This segment will explore the critical role GIS plays in hospital and healthcare preparedness. Examples of conceptual approaches and practical applications in emergency or disaster scenarios will be highlighted.

### Michigan Burn Surge Initiative

This presentation will provide an overview of the statewide Mass Casualty Burn Incident Plan as well as discussing how to prioritize the utilization of limited resources in your facility.

### Implementing a Rural Hospital Incident Command Structure (HICS)

This session will review ways that HICS can work for your small hospital, discuss potential "fits" on your org chart, and explain the logic behind small hospital job action sheets.

### Hospital Continuity of Operations Planning (COOP)

This session will describe the risks of healthcare delivery and the need and challenges for COOP planning.
